Who Are Your Teachers?

In the past, Silver Lake students were told only the last name of their new teachers and the subject that he or she taught.

To help you know who your team teachers are, the following list tells the subject, the teacher, and a phonetic spelling of the teacher's name.

- ancient history - Mr. Bracken (Brak - in)
- English Language Arts - Mrs. Cipura (Si - pour - ah)
- inclusion - Mrs. Nastar (Nah - star)
- math - Mr. Basile (Ba - seal)
- reading - Ms. Collins (Koll-inns)
- science - Mrs. Young (Y-ung)
- Team Leader - Mrs. Andrews (Ann - droos)

What is Appropriate to Wear to School?

The Silver Lake educational community asks that all students come to school dressed neatly, cleanly, appropriately, and modestly.

What is Inappropriate to Wear to School?

The following is a partial list of items that are inappropriate to wear at school: strapless or backless clothing, pajamas (tops or bottoms), shirts with straps less than two-inches wide, clothes that reveal bare midriffs or cleavage, shorts or skirts that are four inches above the knee (or more), or outfits that reveal any undergarments. Are You Ready?

In addition to supplies suggested to you by the school administration (this may be posted on the school web site and/or posted at Staples), here's what you will need in your core subject areas to be ready for a successful start to your seventh grade middle school experience...



ancient history - a two-pocket folder, pencils, and a sturdy three ring binder of any size (the binder is to be kept in the classroom and must contain either a one-subject notebook OR loose leaf paper)

English Language Arts - a two-pocket folder, a "marble" composition notebook and a year long supply of pencils, erasers, and white lined paper.

math - a two-pocket folder, a year long supply of pencils, and a basic calculator. Sorry, cell phone calculators are not allowed.

science - a three ring binder with one divider, loose leaf paper, colored pencils, and index cards (ruled or not)

SSR - a reading book of your choice (visit your local library for some great books)

The team has several locker breaks throughout the course of the day to ensure students do not carry a large quantity of materials at one time. In fact, we would prefer our students carry as little as possible but if you want to carry three inch or larger three ring binder to hold multiple subjects, you're welcome to.

Other classes (world language, health, etc.) may also request that students have additional supplies.

Backpacks are not allowed for use in school. They may be used for transporting materials to and from school but not for class-to-class transportation.

Notes About Homework

- Each of your teachers WILL be assigning homework.
- Homework will count towards your term grade.
- You WILL get homework on some weekends and possibly vacations.
- Each teacher will have expectations on homework like "homework must be done in pencil" or "homework will not be accepted late".
- **Homework is not punishment. It is practice for what you are learning in school.**
- Students who fail to do homework regularly often do poorly on classwork, tests, and quizzes.

"Can We Talk?"

In middle school, students are expected to assume more responsibility for themselves. This kind of independence can seem scary at first, so the team teachers will let parents and students know how they (the students) are doing before report cards are issued.

Some of the ways teachers may communicate with you include: Power School (an on-line grade program that allows you to monitor your child's grades), web pages, mid-term progress reports, phone calls, notes in the student agenda, individual, informal student conferences, team parent meetings, and/or email.

During the school year, you may find that students need help handling these new responsibilities. What can they do? Here are several things former seventh graders have done that have proven useful: review grades posted on Power School, check web pages, staying after school for extra help (late night is over at 2:20 P.M.), seeing the guidance counselor, asking questions in class, organizing papers and notebooks, talking to parents, talking to teachers before or after school, and/or having a "study buddy."
